



SUMMARY

Rafiki, the community shaman, summons all the animals for the birth of the future king, Simba. We follow Simba as he grows and is taught by his father, Mufasa, the reigning king. Scar, Mufasa's brother, is jealous of Simba and Mufasa. He plots with his crew of hyenas to become the Lion King. Simba is caught in this plot and eventually runs away, tormented by the death of his father. Simba eventually finds his way back to the pride with the help of new and old friends and family.

CHARACTER GUIDE

Rafiki: A baboon who uses her mystical powers to guide Simba on his path back home.

Simba: Rightful heir to the Pridelands throne. He's forced into exile by his uncle, Scar.

Mufasa: Strong and compassionate King of the Pridelands. He's teaching his son, Simba, to be a responsible leader and also claim his place as king when he grows up.

Zazu: A hornbill, and Mufasa's dutiful advisor. He becomes flustered whenever rules aren't followed.

Sarabi: Queen of the savanna and Simba's mother.

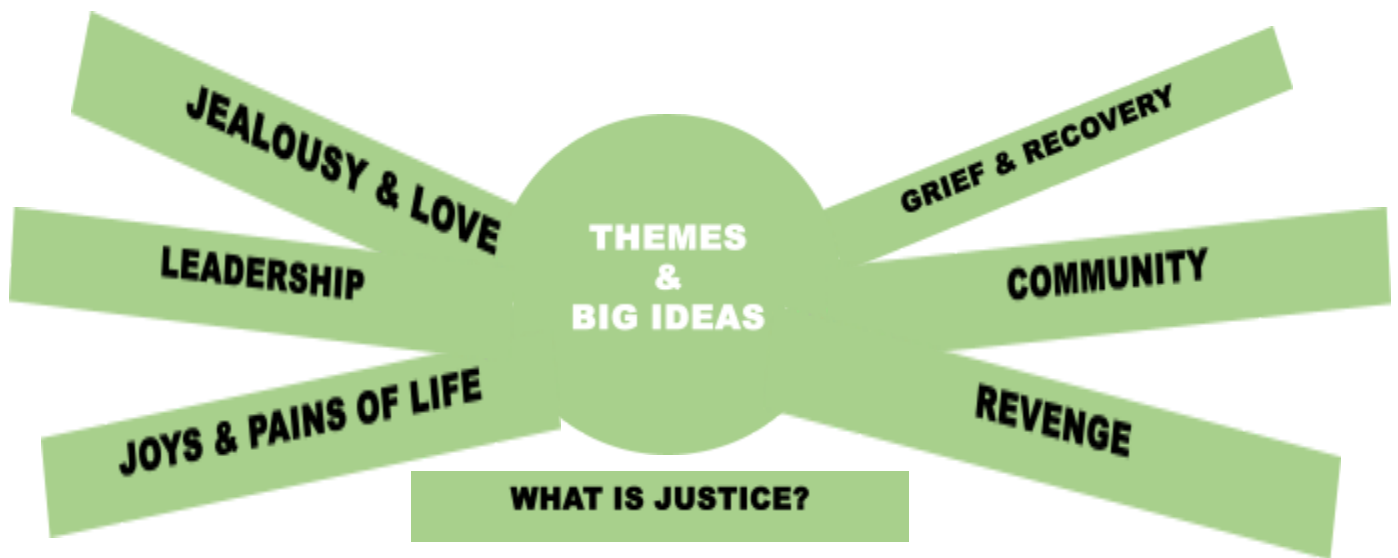
Nala: Inquisitive lioness cub and Simba's best friend. She grows up to be a brave lioness who helps restore order in the Pridelands.

Banzai, Shenzi, and Ed: Trio of hyenas who are loyal to Scar.
